I am missing our normal village life and especially the events that were planned for VE Day though I did see some great photos of the celebrations that people managed to stage from home. I was also sent a picture of the new Union Flag, which was funded from my KCC Member Grant, flying outside Sellindge Village Hall.

With so much changing so quickly, the best place for up to date information is online. As well as <a href="www.gov.uk">www.gov.uk</a> there's <a href="www.kent.gov.uk">www.kent.gov.uk</a> with regularly updated information on how services are affected by Covid-19. Compared with many other parts of the country, Kent's services have largely continued. Our call centre still takes normal calls (some other councils have only taken emergency calls), our road repair service continues (some other councils have only dealt with emergency callouts), over 6,000 KCC staff are working from home, many of them home schooling their children and coping with the same challenges we all face. As I write our libraries and council buildings remain closed but our Household Waste Recycling Centres are re-opened and accepting the full range of waste.

There's an enormous amount of work being done to support vulnerable children and adults in Kent both our everyday work and the extra work brought about by the Covid-19 emergency. On 01 April we launched KentTogether a 24-hour phone line (03000 41 92 92) and online form for people to ask for help for themselves or others. Recently we also had to cope with sharp rise in the number of Unaccompanied Asylum Seeking Children (UASC) arriving in Kent. KCC is currently caring for 469 under 18 UASC Looked After Children (LAC) and 932 UASC Care Leavers. Most strikingly, we have had to cope with 160 new arrivals in 2020 so far (these figures were as reported by 15 May). This is on top of our responsibility to 1,450 of our own indigenous LAC and 1,400 children placed here by other local authorities. We calculate that the additional cost to Kent so far of the UASC arrivals and demands of Covid 19 for isolation is in the region of £200,000 spent already and £672,000 in future commitments. These are costs that are not in our budget and are simply unfair for Kent residents to

meet without help from the Government and you will have seen in the media that KCC Leader, Roger Gough has written to the Home Secretary saying, "If you do not take immediate action, I fear we will shortly reach a position where the County Council no longer has the capacity to accept any more newly arrived UASC from Border Force at the port of Dover, as we will no longer be able to safely meet our statutory duty of care to them."

This is just a small part of the work going on right now. Do please continue to use the website for the most up to date information. Stay safe, help one another and stay alert.

The Hythe Community Hub set up in March with Age UK Hythe & Lyminge and supported by the District Council continues to help vulnerable and isolated residents within Sellindge and surrounding Villages, with no family nearby to support them during this Coronavirus crisis. Very many thanks to all who have given up their time and potentially put their own health at risk to deliver essentials, such as food and medicines; there have been over 12,800 incoming calls, 5,200 outgoing calls and almost 15,000 GP welfare calls made from the Hythe Hub. At the end of May Nestlé provided 4,000 Easter eggs for distribution to those receiving prescriptions and shopping baskets as a bit of a pick-me-

up and the staff and volunteers made sure VE Day was celebrated. Contact details - 01303 269 602 Covid-19@ageukhl.co.uk and this is open 9am-4pm currently 7 days per week but subject to change. The Scrutiny Overview Committee held remotely on 19 May was the first meeting of its kind for the authority and has been organised as part of the measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

The District Council has worked hard to ensure these meetings can resume, allowing District Councillors to continue representing their electorate and making decisions in public. Details of meetings and how to watch live can be found on the website.

Unlike other parts of the County, our kerbside Waste collection service continues to operate uninterrupted and the Garden Waste Service is still operating and is accepting new customers - details on the District Council website.



The business rates team continues to process support grants. As of last week the team has distributed £23,845,000 (more than 82% of the total allocation) to more than 93% of eligible businesses; amazing job well done.

A letter has been sent out to ask that the remaining 150 eligible businesses either claim support or let us know that they do not wish to claim.

Coronavirus Small Business Grant & Retail Hospitality & Leisure Grant Scheme – all businesses eligible for these grants need to provide account details for these payments using an electronic form on the District Council's corporate website which can be accessed through this link

The District Council is setting-up a Discretionary Grant Scheme with additional funding from then Government with the aim of supporting businesses across the District which have not been awarded any grant funding to date.

This is being launched on 6 June and will be open for 3 weeks. Please see website for further details.

## Rev. Chris' Thoughts

Rainbows are everywhere at the moment – decorating windows, doorsteps, banners and even vehicles, having become a symbol of defiant togetherness and hope in a time when we face separation, loss and uncertainty – and of course the danger of the Coronavirus.

In the past weeks for online services, I've taken to wearing my stole (the scarf-like piece of priest clothing) that has Noah's Ark, animals and a rainbow decorating it. I usually wear this for baptisms, being a recognisable story in the Bible for those coming along who are less familiar with church and, moreover, for its symbolism of new life and a fresh start. At baptism there are many symbols of this starting a new life with Christ. There's also a lot of water, which connects with the story of the Ark! Promises are made at baptism too, usually by godparents and parents on behalf of a child, and the story of Noah is about God making and keeping his promise – to keep Noah and his family safe and to not send another flood.

Right now, this Coronavirus pandemic might feel like being in the midst of the great flood like in the story of Noah. We have built our own metaphorical ark, gathering in those around us and keeping safe from the danger around, and now beginning to slowly venture out to test of the flood waters are subsiding. We look to science to provide a promise that it will be gone and will not return, such as a having a vaccine.

The colours of the rainbow remind us that although we are all very different, we are united together into something beautiful – our common humanity, our love and care for each other, shown in so many ways recently. The rainbow is also a symbol of God's promises to us, that through Christ we can hold onto the promise that God is with us no matter what floods or droughts we pass through. Faith does not take away the bad stuff of life, but it gives you the strength to walk on in those dark valleys and look to the light.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you... (Isaiah 43)
