Folkestone & Hythe District has one of the highest number of households in Kent volunteering to take part in the Homes for Ukraine programme. As of 11 April 197 Ukrainians had been matched to 77 sponsors / properties across the district, with 41 property checks completed. The remaining checks should be completed by the end of April. More sponsors are expected to come forward and will be checked as promptly as possible. Information those taking part in the programme is available at

<u>www.folkestone-hythe.gov.uk/community/support-for-Ukraine</u> Welcome packs with advice/guidance for hosts and families is being translated into Ukrainian and Russian. There's also a dedicated telephone number (01303 853600) and email (<u>Ukraine@folkestone-hythe.gov.uk</u>) (This is in addition to KCC's dedicated contact number 03000 412 424.)

The three Community Hubs in Hythe, Folkestone and New Romney (which we used during lockdown) have been re-established as local contact points to support both hosts and guests. We are working closely with KCC and the Hubs will be a base for KCC Support Workers to provide local support for each household. A Folkestone & Hythe Ukraine Community Support Network has also been started including voluntary groups, charities, the Council to ensure that help across the district is co-ordinated and good practice shared.

On 30 March the Full Council debated the final version of our Core Strategy which sets out where development (homes, employment sites, retail and leisure) should be sited. We're pleased to report that it was agreed and our district now has significant protection from speculative development.

The Council has recently issued a District Wide Carbon Plan which is intended to involve the whole district in carbon reduction. Full details are on the website; it is hoped individuals and communities from across the district will get involved.

On 19 April the retrospective application for the overnight parking of 15 HGVs at the rear of the Airport Cafe came to the Planning Committee. We both spoke against permission being granted (as did the parish clerk on behalf of Sellindge Parish Council) but the application was passed. It is a temporary permission ending in 2023 as it falls within the area allocated for Otterpool Park so there should be the opportunity for this use to end at this point. We were at least able to get the condition strengthened about the HGVs only being able to use the site with pre-booking.

The new indoor Skatepark, boxing club, BMX and bouldering venue at F51 in Folkestone was officially opened on 25 March and it's a truly remarkable building and great facility for our district. You can book at www.F51.co.uk (Why the name? F stands for Folkestone and 51 is our latitude.)

We both attended the service of music, reflection and art arranged at St Mary's Church in Sellindge on 13 April attended by Justin Welby the Archbishop of Canterbury. Local artist Lorrain Mailer created most of the installations and the music was composed by Brian George Hanson.

Susan attended the Parish Council meeting on 12 April and Jenny attended the Governors' Monitoring Day at Sellindge Primary School on 30 March followed by a full Governors' Meeting.

Local government has been given the responsibility for co-ordinating the arrangements for the Ukrainian refugees coming to households in Kent. The situation can change rapidly so the best place to look for information for both residents and Ukrainian refugees is <u>www.kent.gov.uk/ukraine</u> Queries about the Ukraine Families Scheme can be emailed to <u>Ukraine@kent.gov.uk</u> or by calling the dedicated helpline 03000 412 424 (this line also has a translation service). KCC's Leader Roger Gough said, "We continue to do everything possible to ensure that Ukrainians arriving in Kent can do so swiftly and safely. DBS checks [checks on criminal records] and home visits are now underway in the county with those kind and generous residents who have been able to provide a safe haven to Ukrainians fleeing the conflict."

As of 13 April 2,064 Ukrainian refugees have been matched with 824 sponsor households in Kent.

The KCC led EV600 network of Electric Vehicle charging points now looks set to be EV800 by the end of the year. Around 100 of these charging points are in car parks belonging to Folkestone & Hythe District Council with the rest across Kent and Medway. You can see more details at <u>www.connectedkerb.com/kent</u> It is estimated there are around 30,000 public charging points in the UK but there are over 400,000 private ones and there's a website – <u>www.cocharger.com</u> – which matches people who want to charge with people who have a charger. People sometimes think you need a special charger to refuel an Electric Vehicle whereas they have two cables, one for fast chargers and one with a normal 3 pin plug which can be used from a normal socket. Most people will be able to recharge their cars at home overnight but there's a growing network of public and commercial charging points to support the switch to electric vehicles.

Another of the environment projects I've been leading at KCC is the purchase of a large solar park in Somerset (mostly funded by a Government grant we won last year). The electricity from this will be used to power Kent's streetlights and the use of solar power will reduce KCC's carbon emissions by around 30% and save around £760,000 a year for the next 40 years. We are also building a smaller solar park at Kings Hill in Kent which will reduce our carbon emissions by around 4%. We hope to build at least three more sites of this size in Kent on closed landfill sites here in Kent.

Storms, road traffic crashes, damage to ships, the P&O problems and a train stuck in the Channel Tunnel have all contributed to the recent delays to cross Channel traffic. KCC does not control the ports or the motorways but we are part of the Kent Resilience Forum which brings together Kent Police, National Highways (formerly called Highways England and responsible for the motorways), Kent Highways and other public agencies to deal with emergencies such as these. We had a very comprehensive presentation on this at our KCC cabinet meeting of 21 April; you can watch it and the subsequent discussion at https://kent.public-i.tv/core/portal/webcasts KCC can't resolve these problems on our own and there's more going on than can be squeezed into these monthly reports as you'll see on the website.
