We both greatly enjoyed the local events to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Tea Party arranged by the local Scouts and Brownies on 28 May in the village hall was a truly impressive event. It was sponsored by Alcaline, Laser, Nu-Steel and Taylor Wimpey. Well done to Maureen Stanley and team. The Sellindge Sports & Leisure Club had a well supported Open Day on 05 June which we attended. It was a great joy to see people coming together again. Thank you to everyone who made the day such a success. The Jubilee Weekend also included free to attend performances at Westenhanger Castle about the history of the area. Do watch out for future community events at the castle and we expect to see many more of these as part of the Otterpool Park development.

June also saw the annual Kent & Medway Civilian-Military Armed Forces Covenant Conference hosted by Folkestone & Hythe District Council at the Leas Cliff Hall in Folkestone. This was attended by the Lord-Lieutenant of Kent, Lady Colgrain who is the Queen's representative in our County as well as senior officers from local army units. Jenny is the Armed Forces Champion at the District Council and led the work that resulted in the Ministry of Defence awarding the Council the Employer Recognition Gold Award. The Armed Forces Covenant also commits the Council to providing support for service families and veterans. You can see more information about this on the District Council website. Those who do not pay their bill by direct debit need to apply online or ring 01303 853 555 and select option two. Your District Council has the unpleasant duty of clearing flytipping from public land as well as investigating and prosecuting those responsible. Do please report flytipping to the District Council and if you have evidence of who did it, such as the vehicle registration or CCTV footage, then report this as well. It's been evidence from residents that has led to successful prosecutions including a recent fine of £784 for a Folkestone man who was seen dumping a mattress, bed base and drawers. There's never any excuse for flytipping and all these items can be taken free of charge to a Household Waste Recycling Centre (open 7 days a week and no limits on the number of times you can visit) or collected for disposal for a small charge by the District Council. We both attended Sellindge Parish Council Meeting on 14 June and Jenny helped with the Sellindge Boot Fair on 11 June.

WESTENHANGER CASTLE

New workshops to run every Tuesday at Westenhanger Castle during the summer holidays

Otterpool Park LLP has teamed up with <u>Strange Cargo</u> to run some new free craft workshops at Westenhanger Castle throughout the school summer holidays.

Otterpool Green Stars (OGS) is a new initiative that encourages young people to think about their environment and the future. The events are the first of a series of OGS activities and will be held every Tuesday throughout the holidays, from 26 July, from 11am to 2pm. They are suitable for children aged 4 and over.

Everyone attending will receive a Otterpool Green Stars membership card with their photo on it. There will be range of fun craft activities, including:

- Create your own Otterpool Green Stars superhero and give them a superpower reducing pollution and waste, protecting plants and creatures, saving water and energy or make up your own!
- Make a clay pot and plant a seed to take home.

The workshops are free to attend, but places must be booked in advance through Eventbrite – just search for 'Westenhanger Castle'.

Tamasin Jarrett, Otterpool Park's Community Services and Events Manager said, "We're excited about our first set of 'Otterpool Green Stars' events, which will be a great summer holiday activity for families and will enable children to learn more about the environment. Over time we are looking to create our own band of green superheroes who care about the environment and want to get involved in future positive activities through the Otterpool Green Stars events.

"It's part of what we stand for at Otterpool Park and recruiting younger generations to help us promote more sustainable lifestyles will hopefully have a positive impact."

Otterpool Park will promote a culture of sustainability and healthy lifestyles. The design of the new garden town has been led by the landscape of the area and 50% of the development will be made up of green spaces. Areas for wildlife will be protected and enhanced and new areas created to reach a 20% improvement to the biodiversity on the development.

Minimal travel distances within the new town will help to reduce car use and make it easy to reach facilities like schools, healthcare and shops by walking and cycling. Buildings are being designed to be low carbon and energy efficient.

Other sustainability commitments include carefully managing water use through water recycling and water-efficient fittings. Wastewater will be treated on-site and new reedbed wetlands areas created to help filter wastewater.

STOUR DOWNS PARISH Vicar's letter – July 2022

When I was a primary school teacher, many colleagues and even some parents thought it was unusual that I lived across the playing field from the school. Often, I was asked what I did when people from school saw me in my garden, walking to work or at the shop, to which I replied, "I say hello!" It seemed odd to me that being at home meant one ought to be able to 'hide away' behind the net-curtains, and I wondered if it was a 'South-East thing' as I was not a native of Kent! Perhaps it was part of my DNA as one destined for a new vocation in ministry where it's all about being part of the fabric of the community and living close to 'work' is somewhat a prerequisite!

The Jubilee celebrations in the past month saw communities come together to celebrate in many ways, and in this celebrating together there were plenty of occasions for getting to know neighbours a bit better and building community through shared joyful experiences. This was echoed in the national events that bought us together in a moment of celebration whether we made it to the crowds in The Mall or watched on screen. It made me think of how there was a collective appetite as a nation to have something to celebrate – coming after the tough couple of Covid years and in challenging economic times, with the backdrop of the awful war in Ukraine.

July is a month for other nations to hold national celebrations, thinking particularly of France and the USA, with their respective Bastille and Independence Day as celebrations cementing national identity and a collective moment to celebrate together nationally and locally. For us in the UK, it seems this year the Jubilee has perhaps served a desire to come together and celebrate – and I wonder if this might be something we lack compared to other nations – an annual national celebration? Whilst Her Majesty's long reign has given us many occasions to celebrate as a nation over the years, including royal weddings and the like, there is not something of the same ilk as the fireworks of Bastille and Independence Day for the UK.

For those of faith, along with the festivals throughout the church year, there is a sense of coming together to celebrate each week in worship (as was missed during the lockdowns), and these gatherings to celebrate knowing the love of God as a church community are open to all to come and be part of.

The joy we get from being part of a community and coming together is a reminder of the call – particularly for those of faith and as modelled by Her Majesty- to serve the community we are a part of, showing our love and care for each other, and finding joy in being together.
