

As some of you know I fell ill with Covid at the beginning of July and was out of action for several weeks. I am still not completely recovered but have started to resume normal life. Last month's newsletter entry was written by Jenny but she's now on holiday so this month is a solo effort from me.

Sellindge suffers more than most when Cross Channel Traffic is disrupted so I'm pleased to report that council leaders from across Kent (including Folkestone & Hythe) have written to Grant Shapps MP the Secretary of State for Transport to call for a long term solution to the problems caused to residents and businesses by gridlocked traffic. Congestion at the Port of Dover and the Eurotunnel terminal at Folkestone increasingly impacts on local road network and is well beyond the resources of local government to resolve.

The District Council has received funding from the Government to help low income pensioners and families with children. The priority will be help with energy bills, food and water bills but there is some discretion to meet other essential costs in exceptional cases. There's also advice for low income home owners on energy Eff iciency measures. Third element of this funding is being used to boost skills in the local green economy.

Further help will be available through the Government's Shared Prosperity Fund as your District Council has made a successful bid for £1 million to be used over the next three years to support vulnerable residents cope with the cost of living. This involves funding for the Community Hubs that were so successful during the Covid lockdowns, food banks, skills training such as how to cook on a low budget, reducing food waste, healthy eating etc. and direct financial help where appropriate.

On 10 August Jenny took Susan Priest the Chief Executive of Folkestone & Hythe District Council on a tour of our North Downs West ward including Sellindge. Susan is following up on various problems they saw but it was also good to be able to show her just what an attractive place Sellindge and its surroundings are.

SELLINDGE WALKING GROUP

We meet at the Village Hall on a Tuesday morning at approximately 10.20am and set off at 10.30am. We walk for 1 and 1/2 hours around the village using local footpaths.

It seems that every year I say it's going to be our most difficult budget ever but our 2023/24 budget looks set to be the most challenging yet. KCC provides a wide range of services such as roads, streetlights, libraries, nurseries, school places, waste disposal, child protection, social care, coroners' service etc. We are very aware that these services, whether they are statutory (the services we must provide) or discretionary (the ones we can choose to provide) are highly valued by our communities. However, as in recent years, we know we will have to make some difficult decisions during the setting of the 2023-24budget to ensure resources continue to be prioritised and money is directed to where it is needed most.

We totally understand that everyone in Kent is currently dealing with a very concerning rise in the cost of living. But the deep-felt impacts of rising inflation, followed swiftly off the back of the punishing pandemic, are presenting us with significant financial challenges. Setting our annual budget is a complex and challenging process involving not just detailed financial analysis but, crucially, conversations with Kent's communities. As we plan our spending for the year ahead we need to hear your views on our Council Tax proposals and your ideas for how we might make further savings. It's an incredibly difficult time for all of Kent's residents and we face exactly the same amount of pressure. We see inflation and the cost of living rising and the fuel price increasing, higher than they have ever been. All of this impacts on our budget just as much as it does our own personal expenditure. The budget consultation was launched on 19 July and closes 05 September. You'll find it online at www.letstalk.kent.gov.uk

We're still doing all we can to win grants for Kent and get the resources we need to make our county a better place to live and work. We are supporting the Government's plans for the Lower Thames Crossing which National Highways believe they can deliver by 2030. This is one part of the jigsaw needed to help reduce the congestion we face with Cross Channel traffic. We have also been successful in winning funding for tree schemes (the recent free tree offer was fully subscribed within days) and flood alleviation projects. Hundreds of households have signed up for the Solar Together scheme which uses collective buying power to get the best deal on solar panels, batteries and EVcharging points. We're also expanding the network of public EV charging points across Kent in a partnership with District Councils and Connected Kerb. I have only been making a slow recovery from Covid so please be patient as I resume duties and catch up on the backlog. If I've missed your email then please resend.

STOUR DOWNS PARISH Vicar's letter – September 2022

September is traditionally the time we mark harvest in churches and school assemblies, although here in our villages we have been watching the combines and tractors busy in our fields and on our roads this summer, already gathering in before the hot weather finally gave way to some rain.

Over two hundred years ago, in the days long before there were large seed drills and combine harvesters, a song was written to celebrate the harvest. It is still well-known today; it starts with the words: 'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land'. It's probably the one you would think of if asked to name a harvest hymn, if that was ever a round on BBC's Pointless!

What can we tell from those words? How was the seed sown? The words suggest the seed – or at least some of it – was sown by throwing it by hand after the field had been prepared with a horse-drawn plough. When it came to harvest time, the same horses would pull the reaper or cutter ready for the crop to be gathered in.

But what happens in the next line of the song hasn't changed. 'But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand'. Once the seed is sown, we rely on the sun and the rain and the nutrients in the soil – everything that comes from creation. In fact, we rely on these things for all of our food – even that which comes in tins and bags and bottles.

The story of creation shows us what an incredible, complicated and beautiful place the earth is. We are asked to care for it, to make sure that natural balance is maintained, but climate change is a result of our failure to do this: affecting the make-up of our atmosphere, the temperature of our waters, the ecosystems and demand for certain foods putting pressure on the natural world. We need to nurture this fragile balance, rather than upset its equilibrium with the way we live our lives.

Perhaps at this harvest time we might be really appreciative not only of those who grow our food and tend livestock, but also the rain we rely on. We might reflect also more deeply in light of recent unprecedented temperatures on the reality of climate change, its impact on our daily lives, and what we might do lessen our own impact on the world around us.
