

22 February. The meeting will be webcast and the council papers will be available online. Our £19m budget provides the maintenance of our prize winning parks and gardens, housing services including help for the homeless, street cleansing, your kerbside waste collection and dealing with planning applications.

Council tax bills are sent out by the District Council but they cover all the other bodies that are allowed to charge a precept (tax). The largest share goes to Kent County Council which pays for social care, waste disposal, roads, school places etc.. The rest of your Council Tax goes to Kent Police, Kent Fire & Rescue service and Sellindge Parish Council. There are several Council Tax (and other) benefit schemes for those in financial difficulties including a hardship fund for those whose circumstances don't fit other eligibility criteria. Information is on the Council website where there's also a live chat facility or you can telephone Customer Services on 01303 853 000, those without digital access there's the Customer Access Point (CAP) at the Civic Centre where computers are available for self-service and staff on hand to assist if needed.

The utility companies are also running schemes to help those who are struggling to pay their bills. One example of this is Southern Water and you can contact them at <a href="mailto:payless@southernwater.co.uk">payless@southernwater.co.uk</a> or: 0800 027 0363 (Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm). Another Council run scheme is the Home Essential Fund. There's funding available for boiler replacement or servicing and, particularly relevant to our area, oil boilers needing to be replaced or tuned up and checked for efficiency, top-up of oil or gas bottles. Application forms will be on the Council website shortly, however please advise us if you know a family who may benefit from this scheme as we are keen that residents in this ward do not miss out because funding on this particular project is only available until the end of March 2023. Other projects, under this heading will follow in the next financial year and we'll keep you updated.

On 27 January the District Council arranged an online engagement event with the Home Office about the Government's use of temporary accommodation in our district (Napier Barracks and hotels) for those seeking asylum in the UK. The meeting was chaired by David Monk, the Leader of District Council and included Roger Gough, Leader of KCC and Folkestone & Hythe MP Damian Collins. Representatives from the Home Office and Kent Police were also invited. The meeting was shown live on the Council's Youtube channel and a recording should be available there shortly if not already posted.

KCC Leader Roger Gough's New Year message published on 31 December is well worth a read. It's still available at <a href="www.kccmediahub.net">www.kccmediahub.net</a> and sets out the challenges that we face in our county as a result of the war in Ukraine, the effects of the pandemic, the breaches of our border along the coast and more. Roger doesn't just list problems but sets out how we are tackling them and the first step is making sure we set and deliver a balanced budget.

One of the ways we will do this is by reducing the number of buildings we run so that we have an estate that we can afford to maintain properly and which is fit for our residents and staff to use. It's also an opportunity to make sure our services are in the right place and to invest in outreach and digital services rather than expect people to make a journey to a Council building. We're starting with our community services — children's centres, facilities for adults with a learning disability, adult education, youth hubs etc. (Some services are proposed to be co-located at our libraries but library services are not directly affected by these proposals.)

The consultation on the proposals started on 17 January and will run for 10 weeks. Do please take part in this consultation and make your views known.

We'll be debating our budget proposals for 2023/24 on 09 February. This all day meeting is webcast live and budget papers are already published and being discussed by Councillors at various Committees. We've been hard hit by inflation and balancing the budget has been exceptionally challenging. We have statutory services such as adult and children's' social care where we are legally obliged to provide services when someone is eligible. As the demand for care rises less money is left for our other services and every year they are squeezed yet further. All Councils with responsibility for social care have been lobbying the Government to find a more sustainable way to fund such social care other than council tax. All are agreed that we can't go on as we are but sadly there is no agreement on what to put in its place.

Part of my special responsibilities at KCC includes our Heritage Team and the Minerals Planning Team and both were involved when the remains of a sixteenth century shipwreck were found in Denge Quarry on Romney Marsh. The story of the find featured on the BBC and you can still watch it on i Player – it's the first episode of Series 10 of <u>Digging for Britain</u>. It was good to see Kent's heritage receive this attention.

#### STOUR DOWNS PARISH Vicar's letter -

February: the shortest month, and this year the month of both Valentines Day and the start of Lent. Both of these make me think of chocolate – giving it as a gift and giving it up.

In the book and film, *Chocolat*, written by Joanne Harris, the central character, Vianne Rocher, arrives in a French village and sets up a chocolate shop across the square from the church. Much to the dismay of the priest and the mayor, she arrives at the beginning of Lent, when they are urging their community to repent and to fast.

One by one, Vianne welcomes the reluctant but curious villagers into her shop, gives them chocolate and hears their life stories, their problems, their pain. And gradually, gently, as the story unfolds, she encourages them to make changes in their lives, to rebuild relationships or move on from broken ones. She welcomes those others reject and treats them with the same love and respect. And the more the church condemns her lack of restraint or respect for the church's teachings, the more people are drawn to her and to one another.

The grumpy grandmother gets to know her grandson and appreciate his talent for drawing, the elderly man after decades musters up the courage to date his childhood sweetheart. The young woman escapes from her violent, drunken husband and a little girl makes new friends. A married couple rekindle romance, travellers are met with a smile and music and dancing are heard on the edge of the village.

Isn't this what the God of love is about: the healing of relationships, the blossoming of love, the helping out of friends in need of a home, the welcoming of outcasts and foreigners, the quashing of prejudice and discrimination? Isn't this what a celebration of Valentine's Day should be about – our demonstrating God's love for each person that says very clearly, 'You are worth it!'

May the God who created chocolate and laughter, shared stories and friendships, be with you.
