

URGENT – Defra update 13.5.24

On 10th of May, a further Asian hornet was found near to Four Oaks, Kent by the NBU in traps set as part of the spring trapping work. In addition, an Asian hornet was located by a member of the public in Lympne, Kent, on 9th of May. The insect was killed, captured, and subsequently collected by an NBU

inspector. Both of these specimens have been sent to the lab for analysis and official confirmation.

Genetic analysis has now been completed on the three other queens found at Four Oaks, Kent, and the single individuals at Romford, London, and Ash, Kent. The analysis has indicated that the hornets found at Four Oaks are overwintered offspring of the nest destroyed in Rye, Kent, in November 2023. Asian Hornet – note the yellow legs \rightarrow However, there is no evidence to show that the hornets found in Romford and Ash are the offspring of any of the nests from last year. The NBU is continuing the spring trapping work, which includes monitoring the areas around Lympne and Four Oaks.



Please. Be vigilant. These are being described as over wintered queens. They have hidden away all winter. The one in Ash was apparently in a garden shed.

But there is a lot of European Hornets emerging now. They are harmless. Please do not hurt them.

Sellindge Parish Council Annual Report

The Parish Council has had a very busy year, with various changes taking place. Both the Lees open Space and the 999-year lease for the office, has been handed over, both of these documents took up a lot of time to read and digest to ensure that the Parish was getting a fair deal.

Moving forward on both these projects has been convoluted for a number of reasons, these include;

- the section 106 money will not be coming to the Parish Council until mid-June when the next Payment tranche from the District Council takes place,
- While the Parish Council has ordered a large enough sit on mower this has taken 2 months to be delivered and will not be here until the middle/late June
- Any work programmes that are being chased by members of the public are not yet available as until it's known how long different elements to managing it take a proper plan will be grown organically.
- There are also many requests for different things to be placed on The Lees, and until these have all been considered in detail will not take place, in addition there are other open spaces coming forward which may have an effect on what is put where.
- Finally the outstanding issues often highlighted at meetings, will sadly take some time as they are with other authorities and organisations to confirm/agree and manage; all of these are outside of the Parish Council and Taylor Wimpey remit and both of us are working together to get these resolved.

With regards to the office, this needs to be fully fitted out so quotes for all the elements will need to be arranged before the work can be completed, however you may see people in and out of the building now we have the keys. If you would like to have a look at any time and you see the Clerk or one of the Councillors in the building do pop your head in the door and say hello.

Your Parish Council has agreed in principle to review the Parish Plan, and it is hoped that some of you would be willing to volunteer to become involved. This work will be taken on by one of the Committees, but there is other work volunteers can get involved with.

For those who were not at the Annual Council Meeting in May, as there is now a full compliment of Councillors some of the work will be taking place within a Committee, so you may see a change in the items that are on the monthly Parish Council agendas.

Moving on, there is much more to complete and manage than just the above two projects, the Parish Council now wishes to look at replacing missing bus shelters, and putting in new ones if required, and as already mentioned there is the review of the Parish Plan: this will need a new housing survey, so do fill in the forms when they drop on your doormat or find their way to your in box.

The Ground staff are keeping the Parish looking clean and tidy, but it is very important, that all residents realise they also play an important part in this by not dumping rubbish just anywhere.

The Sellindge Snippets has recently been circulated, and you will have seen details of an event on The Lees, on 9th of June to Commemorate the D-Day landings 80 years ago.

Your Parish Council have arranged for some activities to be on the Lees so we hope that some of you will be bringing along a picnic, Face painting for the Children will be Free of Charge, Applause Actors will be introducing everyone to Daria the Dream Dragon, and it is hoped that there will be some other activities too.

While we will mourn those who did not return, we should also be celebrating those who survived and was able to tell their stories, some 80 years after the event. *From your Parish Council Clerk – Linda Hedley*

I have served on the Police & Crime Panel as an appointed Conservative representative and I hope to continue in that role. One of the many initiatives promoted by Matthew has been the setting-up of Police Cadet Units which I have also actively supported.

There have not been any more landslides in Folkestone but, for safety reasons, KCC has announced that Remembrance Road will remain closed until the end of the year. The good news is that the zig-zag path on the Leas Cliff has reopened.

A new shuttle bus service will be running from 20th July to 1st September from Folkestone West Station to the Harbour Arm with several stops including the Town Centre. The service will run every 30 mins and have a flat fare of £2.

Following recent changes and reorganisation, the Council are now looking for a new Independent Chair to lead the Otterpool Park LLP board. Details of the position can be found on the Council's website. The District Council are delighted that Otterpool Park has been included within Homes England's business plan for next year. Working in partnership we hope to deliver the wastewater treatment plant and highways improvements before the first phase commences.

125 council owned properties have been refurbished as part of the Social Housing Decarbonisation project and the tenants are reporting lower energy bills. A further 300 properties are being assessed to be included in the next wave of funding.

Also, there are still funds available in the Rural England Prosperity Fund so if you are a small business that is thinking about making an investment or a community project, please check out the details on the Folkestone Works website and make an application for funds. We have had two successful grant applications approved in our ward already.

SELLINDGE WALKING GROUP

We meet at the Village Hall on a Tuesday morning at approximately 10.20am and set off at 10.30am. We walk for 1 and 1/2 hours around the village using local footpaths. This does involve crossing fields and climbing over stiles so appropriate footwear is advisable.

We are no longer part of the NHS Walking for Health Scheme just a group of locals who enjoy walking. Everyone walks at their own risk.

One of KCC's responsibilities is Public Health for which we receive a 'ringfenced' grant from central Government (this means it has to be spent on Public Health and nothing else). Public Health is different from other health services as it is about improving the way we live so that we don't become ill. It's about encouraging us to take more exercise, reduce obesity, reduce drinking alcohol and stop the spread of disease including sexually transmitted diseases. Recent campaigns have been to encourage take up of Covid 19 vaccinations for the most vulnerable and for those who missed their MMR (Measles, Mumps & Rubella) jabs to be vaccinated. This year the Stop Smoking grant will be targeting committed smokers to recruit them to a quit programme and young (12 – 25-year-olds) smokers. There will also be a continuing campaign to promote local stop smoking services.

There are also initiatives under way to help people achieve the recommended 150 minutes of physical activity or more and the most recent survey has found that 63% of adults in Kent & Medway are achieving that. There's information on local activities to help more people (whatever their present level of fitness) become active at www.activekent.org Related to this is a network of more than 130 Public Health Champions across Kent and Medway. These are volunteers who are trained to help others achieve both physical and mental wellbeing.

The environment we live in also contributes to our mental and physical well-being and this aspect of Nature is increasingly valued. It's certainly part of the 'Making Space for Nature' work that KCC is leading for Kent and Medway and which will create a Local Nature Recovery Strategy. (This is again a project funded by central Government). Workshops have been taking place across Kent and Medway and there are online surveys open to anyone with an interest. From some 800 suggested outcomes for nature a draft shortlist of 60 has been created. The next stage is to agree this and create the action plan to deliver it. I'm pleased to report that KCC has recently been successful in its 5 yearly re-evaluation for the Ministry of Defence Employer's Recognition Gold Award. KCC was an early signatory to the Armed Forces Covenant which is about supporting Armed Forces (including reservists) and their families. More information on this is on the KCC website.

I attended Sellindge Parish Council on 14 May to give my KCC report and to listen to local views.

STOUR DOWNS PARISH Vicar's letter –

On June 6th this year it is the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings, where Operation Overlord saw Allied Troops storm the Normandy beaches in France. This of course was the beginning of the Allied journey pushing through occupied Northern Europe and on towards Germany, finally bringing the six-year conflict to a close.

This was the largest seaborne invasion and probably one of the most famous actions of the Second World War. It brought together Allied Troops from across the globe working together on this operation, that had been a huge effort to keep as secret as possible for the element of surprise. The liberation of our European neighbours began at this point, and later the scale of the horror of the Holocaust began to be revealed as the Allies reached further West.

As the years roll by, we mark the passing of significant anniversaries of landmark events, such as D-Day. It is noticeable that few of those who took part at the time are still with us. Almost all of us today have a connection to those who served during the Second Word War, through family or community heritage. Each year we remember the names of those who fell in conflict in our community gathering for Remembrance. More than 100 years on from the first global conflict, we still stop for an annual act of Remembrance as an opportunity to pause and reflect, to give thanks and honour the memory of those who gave their lives to defend our democratic freedoms. It is important to remember, to look back, and to learn from the past. We cannot change our future if we do not take heed of these lessons. Yet our news is dominated today by the continued devastation of conflict in both Ukraine and the Middle East.

It has been a privilege in my ministry here, which sadly comes to an end as I move in July to a new post in Herne, to have been Chaplain to a local Royal British Legion branch. There are about 2300 RBL branches in the UK and overseas, which are a focal point for social activity and support. The Royal British Legion, whose new patron is HM The King, describes membership as being "a messenger of remembrance".

I hope that you might take a moment to pause on 6th June and in your own way be a "messenger of remembrance". God bless, *Chris*
